Rules and Regulations.

1.—The Prizes offered in the accompanying Schedule are confined to the inhabitants of the Parishes of Nether Whitacre, Over Whitacre, Kingsbury, Lea Marston, Shustoke and Curdworth.

2.—Exhibitors must send their exhibits between the hours of 7 and 10 on the day of the Show, and see that the Exhibitors' Cheques are securely fastened to their exhibits.

3.—Only bonâ fide Exhibitors will be admitted before the entrance to the field is closed at 10 a.m.

4.—The Judges will commence judging at 11 o'clock, and their decision will be final. No person, except officials, will be allowed in the tent during the judging.

5.—All specimens must be the bonâ-fide property of the Exhibitor (excepting Class 13), and have been in his possession at least six weeks previous to the Show. The Committee reserve to themselves the right to see the intended exhibits of any Exhibitor before the Show. Anyone intending to exhibit and refusing to allow any Member or person appointed by the Committee to see his exhibit, or to visit his garden before or after the Show, shall not be allowed to exhibit. The Committee reserve to themselves the right to refuse the entry of any intending Exhibitor.

6.—Any Exhibitor attempting to defraud will be disqualified from receiving any Prize, and from showing at any future Show.

7.—The Prizes will be given away at 5-30 o'clock.

8.—Any person having any objection to make, shall do so *in writing* on the day of the Show before 4-30 p.m., and shall deposit One Shilling (1/-) with the Secretary, which will go to the Society's funds if the objection be not sustained.

9.—The Committee will not be responsible for damage done to any of the exhibits during the Show, but all ordinary care will be exercised, and their decision on any disputed point shall be final.

10.—No exhibits to be removed before 7 o'clock.

11.—No person to enter more than one exhibit in any class, and unless there are three entries only one prize will be given, but no prize will be awarded unless the Judges specially recommend it.

12.—All Competitors to send in their names, with the classes in which they intend to compete, to any Member of the Committee, on or before August 4th, before 8 p.m.

13.—When making his entries each Exhibitor will receive a ticket to admit him to the Show.

14.—The Entrance Fee will be for any number of entries in the Amateurs' Class, 2/6, and in the Cottagers' Class, 6d.

15.—The Judges will be instructed to take into their consideration, in making their awards, the size of the gardens, and the neatness of appearance and evidence of care in preparing the plants exhibited, and not the size only. In the Fruit and Vegetable Class, quality will be considered before quantity.

16.—The Public will be admitted to the Show at 2 p.m., on payment of 1/- till 4 p.m.; after that time till 8 p.m., the admission will be 3d. School children under 14 half-price.

17.—Any visitor quarrelling or behaving in an improper manner will, if not desisting on being cautioned, be removed from the field. Any intoxicated person will be at once expelled.
